

Lesson 28:

From Master to Lord: More fish than we could ever imagine Matthew 4:13-22; Luke 5:1-11

I. Is the Right Spot?

- > Scholars disagree about this harmony placement and about these passages
- > Sometimes Scripture can seem incongruent, but It always tells the truth
- > These are either two different stories or different perspectives
- II. <u>Matthew 4:13-17</u> Matthew uses these verses to continue his proof that the life of Jesus was a fulfillment of Scripture

III. <u>vv.18-22</u>

- A. Note these things:
 - v.18 Andrew is mentioned
 - v.19 Greek word here for "men" is anthropi which means "mankind"
 - First take may look like they were on the shore when Jesus said follow Me
 - v.21 Appears Zebedee, James and John were just down the shore

IV. <u>Luke 5:1-3</u>

- A. v.1 First time "word of God" used in Luke
- B. Keep in mind the witnesses Luke has already shown us about Jesus: Gabriel, Zechariah/Elizabeth, Mary, Simeon, Anna, John the Baptizer
- C. The crowd along the shore is surely different than what He left in Nazareth

V. <u>vv.4-5</u>

- A. $\underline{v.4}$ "your nets" is plural "all y'all's nets" Shows there were others there even though Peter is the focus
- B. Why would Jesus ask Peter to "go into the deep"?
 - 1. Jesus knew they had not caught anything and was providing for His disciples
 - 2. Get away from the crowd
 - 3. Peter's continued discipleship
 - 4. All the above (my guess)
- C. v.5 "Master" is Greek word epistates same root as episkopos (bishop) Only used in Luke in all of NT
 - 1. Jesus' previous times with Peter shows up here as his Master
 - 2. "At your word" At God's word creation came into existence and many other things
- D. No Excuses from Peter (unlike Nick) (thanks David Guzik)
 - "I worked all night and I'm tired."
 - "I know a lot more about fishing than a carpenter does."
 - "The best fishing is at night, not in the daytime."
 - "All these crowds and loud teaching have scared the fish away."
 - "We already washed our nets."
 - "Jesus may know religion, but He doesn't know fishing."

VI. <u>vv.6-7</u>

- Will there always be results when Jesus directs our work? Yes
- Will we immediately see the results? Maybe

VII. <u>vv.8-11</u>

- A. v.8 He's now Simon Peter
 - <u>John 1:42</u>: He brought him to Jesus. Jesus looked at him and said, "You are Simon the son of John. You **shall be** called Cephas" (which means Peter).
- B. What did Peter NOT say? "Wow look at the fish! This is awesome!
- C. Jesus was his Master in v.5 and his Lord in v.8



- D. Peter's sanctification:
 - 1. Saw the Lord in His miraculous glory
 - 2. Immediately realizes his sinfulness and unworthiness
 - 3. Receives a divine commissioning
- E. Anybody else have this same pattern? <u>Isaiah 6:1-13</u>

VIII. My Take Aways

- > God will use circumstances (could be a miracle could be a tragedy) for us to see Him on His throne
- > My choice is to fall at His knees or make excuses
- ➤ He wants to be my Lord and not only my Master
